FROM THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Parents and Community Members,

2016-17

In Lebanon Schools, we seek to provide a culture of universal support, achievement, and opportunities for all students. We also value rigorous coursework, high expectations, and seek to promote college and career readiness for all. For the second year in a row we have expanded opportunities for students in the area of CTE (career and technical education) by expanding programs, enrollment, and participation in this area. We also have created more opportunities for students through middle school sports and electives, and we have expanded the AVID College Readiness System to all schools, K-12.

The AVID Schoolwide college and career readiness system focuses on improvement for key domains of operations: Instruction, Systems, Leadership, and Culture. As all of our schools continue to improve in each of these domains, we will see greater achievement and success in our students.

Through our commitment to rigorous coursework, we have expanded opportunities for students to take advanced classes at our middle school and high school. We have also created additional supports for students who are behind so they can make catch up growth. As a result of these

efforts, in the fall of 2017, 365 students were enrolled in at least one AP course—more than 25% of the high school enrollment. This figure does not include the 50 plus juniors and seniors taking college level courses at Linn Benton Community College or the variety of College Now courses we offer

Graduation rates and attendance rates are continuing to increase over last year, but we still have room for improvement. We have set the rigorous goal of a 90% graduation rate along with Zero dropouts. It is our hope to achieve this goal within three to five years. Last year, Lebanon High School was awarded a Closing the Achievement Gap award for eliminating the racial graduation rate that typically exists in most schools around the state.

We are proud of the progress, achievement, and opportunities that faculty, staff, and administrators are providing for students in the Lebanon Community. Thank you for your ongoing support.






